Planing wood to perfection



Bird Feeder



I made this project for my garden it was made with tanalised shed wood and I used various joining methods, such as rebate and housing joint and decorated it to blend in with nature. It was a very fun project to complete.

The Butchers wife



Here we have a butcher's most prized possession a sturdy chopping board crafted with beautiful elm wood. I made the handle to fit my customers hand, so it felt comfortable to carry. The wood finishing I did later that day was some clear mineral oil which really brings out the woods grain!

Home sweet home...



Simple but eye-catching design the lid is flush to the back board with a butt hinge and the bird box hang from the key shaped hole on a fence.

Floral surprise



I used CLS wood to make the table, with mortise and tenon joints cut at a 45° angle so they meet at 90° this was for the framework whereas the tabletop was glued together and slotted on top with the 4 corners notched out. The inlay ended up being routed for the illusion because the CLS was not suited to cutting straight through. Finally, I gave all my wood a much-needed sanding and stained it walnut and antique pine for the insert and stencilled on a Pansie flower.

Door board restoration



I had been putting off this job for a while, but it was something I had planned carefully. It's slightly curved and needed new pilot holes to sit the screw flush below the surface which is why I added 1mm clearance to the diameter.

Bird station palace



This bird station has a mixture of elm as well as a cherry wood mount. It is roughly 1.1 metres In height and features a hand carved bowl, chamfered edges and metal angle plates.
